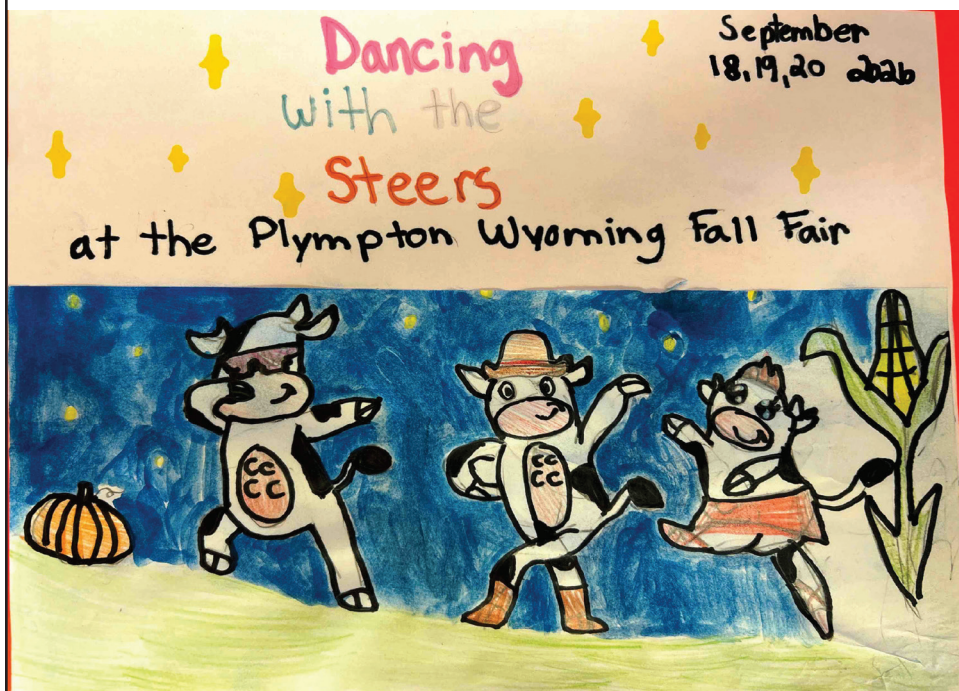

WYOMING FAIR RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All competitions for the following prizes will be open to the province, except where otherwise specified in the Prize List.
2. The Annual Membership Fee will be \$5 (five dollars). Non-exhibitors will be charged \$10 on Saturday for entrance tickets. All children in the parade are free. Car free. A Registered firm is regarded as one exhibitor. Only one member of the firm will be admitted to the grounds on the ticket that entitled the firm to compete, and in no case will the ticket be transferable. Directors must make returns to the Treasurer no later than the day of the Fair in each year.
3. Each exhibitor entry ticket will entitle the exhibitor to any number of entries. The exhibitor entry fee will be 10% of the winnings plus the odd cents to make the amount end in 0 or 5, will be deducted from the prize money before payment and will be considered a contribution to the prize money.
4. Exhibits will be accepted Thursday, 3:00pm-8:00pm, and Friday, 8:00am-12 Noon. No exhibits accepted after 12 Noon, except under certain circumstances at the discretion of the executive of the board.
5. Every animal, article, product and chattel exhibited must be the actual bona-fide property and belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or exhibiting the same. In the case of every article, product or chattel exhibited other than livestock, the said article, product or chattel must be of the actual production, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of the person or persons showing and exhibiting the same, not more than two years previous, grain excepted.
6. In the event of doubt as to any exhibitor having complied strictly with the provisions of Rule 5 or 21, the Committee, consisting of the President, 1st Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, or any two of them, shall be obliged to cause any exhibitor with reference to whom any such notice has been given, to make a Statutory Declaration of a compliance with the terms of said Rules 4 to 21.
7. Upon the discovery of any fraud, deception or dishonest practice, either in the preparation of, or by any misrepresentation concerning any article of property exhibited, which may have affected or which was intended to affect, or the discovery of any deception as to ownership of the article or property exhibited, deception or dishonest practice by the person or persons exhibiting, or by any person on his or her behalf, the Board of Directors shall withhold the payment of the prize awarded as well as any and all other prizes awarded to said exhibitor, or to anyone who acted improperly on his or her behalf, and shall prohibit any such person or persons above referred to, from exhibiting in any class for one year or more, and may publish the names of such person or persons, if deemed expedient.
8. All articles intended for competition must be entered in strict accordance with the Prize List, or order to secure a prize in the exact quantity stated in Prize List adhered to. Any entry disqualified under this rule shall be marked by a card of disqualification by the Superintendent of the Department.
9. Cattle must be on the grounds and in place at 11:00am and no animal shall be allowed to compete in more than one class or section, except in the case of specials or when shown in pens, herds or sweepstakes. It is the responsibility of the owner to make sure animal is CFIA tagged, if not, the animal is not allowed on the fairgrounds.
10. All Horses and Cattle must be on the grounds and secured by the head, and Sheep confined in pens, and owners shall comply with such minor regulations for their safe custody and fare and complete exhibition as the Committee

of Management may suggest on the day of the show. All Colts, except foals, must be exhibited by the halter.

11. Persons exhibiting purebred stock must give their names and numbers to the Secretary at the time of making entries. For young animals the name of the animals and names of sires and dam may be accepted for those less than one year. Certificate of registration must be produced for all animals when they are shown. In all breeding classes of livestock, male animals shown must be purebred; no others will draw prize money.
12. Exhibitors interfering with the judging will forfeit winnings.
13. The decision of the Judge or Judges shall be final as to awarding of prizes and no appeal shall be considered.
14. Grain must be the growth of the current year. Grass Seeds may be the product of the previous year.
15. No animal or article exhibited shall be removed from the grounds before 4:30pm in the afternoon of the Fair Day of the Exhibition. Non-compliance with Rule will result in the forfeiture of prizes awarded to such animals or exhibits.
16. Diligence will be used by the Officers of the Society to ensure the safety of articles sent to the Exhibition and to prevent injury or loss to animals, but the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting and, should any article be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will not make any payment of the value therefore, or be otherwise liable.
17. Five Dollars (\$5) will be retained and applied to the exhibitor entry fee for the ensuing year, in the case any exhibitor taking \$10 or over in prizes at the exhibition of the present year.
18. Notice is hereby given that Officers of the Society may, by their Rules and Regulations, prohibit and prevent theatrical, circus and mountback performances, exhibition and shows, and no games of chance or gambling will be permitted on the Grounds or within 300 yards. The Society may also regulate or prevent huckstering or trafficking in fruits, goods, wares or merchandise on Exhibition Grounds, or within 300 yards thereof, any persons who, after due notice of such Rules and Regulations, violates the same, shall be liable to be removed by the Officer, Policeman or Constables of the Society and the clauses 27 and 28 of the "Agricultural And Arts Act of 1895," shall be enforced.
19. Where there is no competition, prizes will be awarded according to the decision of the Judges.
20. The Society will not be responsible for any person being injured in any way on the grounds.
21. No member of the Society shall be allowed to judge at their local fair.
22. All entries for exhibit building are to be in place by 12:00 Noon, on the Friday. Doors will close at 1:00pm for judging and will re-open when the hall is completely set-up and secure.

SPECIAL PRIZES

Donations of Special Cash Prizes must be received on or before the last day of the Show, deposited with the Treasurer of the Society the amount so donated; otherwise, the Society will not be responsible for the payment of said prize. Winners of such prizes, when the article is to be retained, must deliver same to donor before payment. In Specials, all weights, etc., must be stated. In cases of lightweights, etc., prizes must be retained, and donors are requested not to accept articles.

In all classes except stock, when the articles named in Specials are the same as those mentioned in the Society's Prize List, the exhibit in each section must be separate and distinct. In no case shall the same article be allowed to compete in two different sections.

PICK-UP OF EXHIBITS

All retained articles may be picked up after 5pm on the Friday or on the Saturday until 4:30pm. The exhibits will remain until the Sunday. The doors will be locked at 4:00 pm and re-open after 4:30pm when the hall is completely ready for articles to be picked up. All exhibits must be picked up at this time.

Members meet the first Tuesday of every month at 7:30 p.m. in the boardroom. The Directors meet at the call of the chair to deal with specific matters, and not on a regular basis. If any person has any recommendations to offer the Society regarding the fall fair operations or any other matter regarding the Society, please feel free to contact them. (See above for numbers).

Registration can be picked up and entry fee of \$5 is paid at McKay Park from 10:00 am to 10:55 am. Judging begins at 11:00 am on the Saturday.

The other fair activities can continue immediately after the parade as scheduled.

SCHOOL PARADE

The schools taking part are to have their Pupils meet at McKay Park at 11:15 am SHARP! All Staff and Students will parade to the Plympton-Wyoming Fair Grounds. Each School will prepare and carry a School Banner that has been designed and completed by the students only.

Please note: School Buses may be used to transport Students during the parade; however, buses are not allowed to stop and load/unload Students on the fairgrounds or on the parade route (ex: Main Street) for liability reasons. This will also prevent any disruption of the parade, moving along in order that all parade participants may complete the route and the other fair activities can continue immediately after the parade as scheduled.

Registration opens at 9:00am. Show starts at 11:00am - SHARP!

Show Rules:

1. All line classes are to be shown before the performance classes.
2. Each horse cannot be entered more than once in each class.
3. Each horse shown must have its own number at a cost of \$5.00 each.
4. Each section entered costs \$2.00.
5. Special classes open to all ages unless otherwise specified.
6. Please have your entry number visible before entering the show ring.
7. Exhibitors must have proof of insurance and documentation including policy number and expiration date.
8. Youth 18 years and under are required to wear ASTM approved helmets.
9. Each horse receives a number—the horse owners name is to be shown as the exhibitor.

This year, as in the past, we will try to streamline the program to save the exhibitor's time. If we have no registration for a class and section, we will not call same.

Due to routing of the fair parade, we will suspend the horse show for a brief period of time to allow the parade to enter the grounds.

This will ensure the safety of the exhibitors and their horses.

****During the performance classes, exhibitors are to use a flat walk, a jog or a trot, and a lope or canter. Patterns will be provided at the time of registration for classes requiring a pattern****

If any entry wins Grand Champion or Best of Hand-Quilted Classes OR Grand Champion or Best of Show of all Machine Quilted Classes at more then one Fair, the other Fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, should enter their Reserve Champion or Second Best Of Show Of Hand-Quilted Classes OR Reserve Champion or Second Best Of Show Of Machine Quilted Classes quilt/wall- hanging in the District Competition. Note: If an Exhibitor wins Grand Champion or Best of Show Of HandQuilted Classes OR Grand Champion or Best of Show Of Machine- Quilted Classes at other than his/her own Fair, or at more than one Fair, the Exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the District Meeting. It will be judged again and the winner will go to the Ontario Agricultural Societies Convention in Toronto in February 2027. The entry judged BEST OF SHOW at the February Convention will be declared the ONTARIO ASSOCIATION OF AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES’
